INCLUDING MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 11 MEETING

### **Evening Presentation - Phyllis Neufeld**

This past October (10/23) **Phyllis Neufeld** and her husband traveled with the tour company, <u>Hurtigruten</u>, to both Patagonia and Antarctica. Phyllis promises to talk about Patagonia sometime in the future and the program on this occasion concentrated on the Antarctic portion of the trip, starting with the crossing of the Drake passage, a "narrow" (~850 km) strait between Cape Horn and the South Shetland Islands. The videos Phyllis offered showed that this section of ocean lived up to its rep – high wind, high waves, seabirds on the wing and icebergs. There were also fine stills of the same. Indeed, the trip was largely characterized by the harshness of the environment.

The first landfall was in the South Shetland Islands where the intended first visit (to Aitcho Island) was canceled due to the presence of bird flu amongst the penguin colonies there. Traveling on, it was possible to debark at Half Moon Island for some snowshoeing. The curious penguins were amusingly oblivious to the humans' resolve to maintain a distance between the species of no less than 15 feet (5 meters). The expedition participants quickly became adept at identifying the amphibious fauna of the area: penguins and seals – there is no food to sustain terrestrial fauna in these latitudes.

The ship and its company kept on, visiting islands in the archipelago, all the while approaching landfall at the Antarctic Peninsula, where the first visit was to Neko harbor. It was at this point that the hitherto unremittingly gray skies broke and the landscape became a good deal less gloomy but no less impressive or inhospitable. Snow and blue sky go so well together! Skies blue or gray, the occasional patch of red (e.g., penguin guano, the rusted hulk

of the Governoren) added welcome variety. Crossing paths with a rarely-encountered <u>Arnoux's beaked whale</u> was a highlight.

Phyllis constructed her presentation in imitation of a photo album in which each succeeding page might have any number of related images displayed in any arrangement. One or several photos might be commented upon but there were often plenty more to which the eye could wander. These pages helped move things along and added a comforting sense of context while the occasional appearance of single photos added emphasis. Phyllis concluded her talk with a slide reading only, "A Trip of a Lifetime". Indeed, such an adventure is probably on a good number of bucket lists. Interestingly, according to the January 7, 2024 front page of the Boston Sunday Globe, perhaps as many as 100,00 tourists made the trek to Antarctica in 2023 - big business that must inevitably put some pressure on the environment. Still, one suspects that there may have been some presentation attendees who, having noticed the hardiness required, were left considering putting not going to Antarctica high on *their* to-do lists. Nevertheless, the group was very appreciative of having had the vicarious experience through the medium of Phyllis' enjoyable presentation. Next stop, Patagonia...




