Anne Umphrey continues her pursuit of photography using her iPhone. She had several images of local scenes. The first was of footprints in the snow by the Sudbury seen from a bridge. There was a photograph of the boathouse at the Old Manse about which she sought opinions of cropping and processing. Several bird feeder pictures rounded out the offering.

Travel to photo-rich locales has been a bit iffy, lately (if you hadn't heard...)

Ed McGuirk offered a collection of single images from favorite winter trips made when it was safe to travel. The really extreme winter conditions were represented by, first, a polar bear taken in Churchill, Manitoba and, second, an image of the northern lights

shot in Fairbanks, Alaska. These conditions were such that batteries would only last for a matter of minutes before they needed to be swapped out and placed in the queue of several reserve batteries to be rewarmed (with body heat) for later use. Extreme cold doesn't drain batteries but, rather, the chemical reactions cease to be able to take place. Winter images from Utah of snow and red rock (Bryce, Zion, Arches and Canyonlands) rounded out Ed's offerings.

Karin McQuillan presented a collection devoted largely to favorite winter critters with some landscape thrown in. Owl, crow and swans represented the avian group, the ungulates included moose and bison and, to keep them all on their toes, the trickster, Coyote made an appearance or two. A particularly lovely image of a beam of light cutting through dark cloud was taken at the top of Teton Pass elicited excited discussion among those participating.

Hendrik Broekman displayed five before and after pairs of winter images taken locally.

Our newest member, Jean Fain, offered images taken with her Google Pixel smartphone camera. Local pics included Marshall Farms, the Assabet at sunset taken from Damon Mill and a barn in Groton, MA. From wider afield, we were treated to images from California: the dog beach in La Jolla and from Joshua Tree NP in Palm Spring.
