January Presentation: Mark Hopkins

Mark Hopkins gave a delightful in-person talk, titled *It's Never Too Late* to a small but appreciative gathering. Mark's talk is one he normally gives to photographic innocents which is meant to explain not only the whys of being a photographer but many of the ensuing wherefores, as well. His assertion that the camera pales in importance in comparison to the eye of the photographer is no doubt mind bending to some (if not eye-opening), but Mark's point was directed toward the need to see, really see, whatever you're looking at. To paraphrase, "Paying attention - seeing what you see - is what being perceptive is all about." Thus armed, a photographer can capture superior images with just about any camera he or she might be competent to use.

The visual component of the presentation was split up between entertaining didactic slides and Mark's wonderful images of such things as Turkey Tail mushrooms in a strawberry field, tree roots exposed along a river bank, closeups, creatures, window frost ... and the list goes on.

Mark finished his talk with a brief discussion of the travails of self publishing. Having already produced three books in this fashion in association with Amazon, he knows whereof he speaks. The TLDR is that the process is tedious, fraught with difficulties and a good way to avoid making a profit, but remains an efficient way to get one's work off the computer and into people's hands. The group was enthusiastic in their praise of the presentation.

Around the Web: New Year's Retrospectives

Along with fireworks in gloriously wretched excess, the transition between years often brings sundry lists of all sorts. This newsletter item is one such, and lists three different takes on what a year-end photographic retrospective on YouTube can be. One video that grabbed my eyes is this effort by the fine Danish landscape photographer, Mads Peter Iversen. In the presentation, he engages in lots of discussion (in fluent English) of the photos and conditions in which they were shot, along with some behind the scenes (BTS) footage. N.B., his videos are adverts for his own photography instruction business. Even so, the photography is first rate.

Another interesting video is by Steve Perry which is titled, "Why I Photograph Wildlife and Best Photos of 2022." If you close your eyes, it is a cogent explanation of his purpose in being a wildlife photographer. If you turn the sound down, it is a slide show of wonderfully accomplished wildlife photography.

But my favorite is this very well done, relatively short video (wordless) by the gifted Scottish nature photographer, Espen Helland, featuring twenty one of his favorite wildlife photos from 2022. The whole video is set to instrumental music, mostly of a Celtic cast, which I find rather attractive (not my usual reaction to other peoples' soundtracks.) Display of the photos takes up a minority of the screen time. The bulk of the presentation is comprised of appropriate B-roll providing context and ambience as well as a good deal of BTS footage. In essence, this is a collection of 21 miniature videos, each telling something about the story of the photo that appears at its conclusion. Well-paced, very engaging, and highly recommended.


Please Note – All meetings are held on the 2nd Thursday of the month, at 7:00 pm, either via Zoom or at our location (or both):
