Wayne Hall highly recommends visiting this exhibit:

The National Heritage Museum on Route 2A in Lexington is currently featuring a stunning exhibit by Quang-Tuan Luong entitled "Treasured Lands – the 58 U. S. National Parks in Focus" until October 17, 2010. Luong is a modern-day Ansel Adams – mountain-climbing, wilderness trekking, kayaking, etc. schlepping a view camera and shooting often under rather extreme conditions. Unlike Adams, all of his work is in color. He has an advanced degree in artificial intelligence, but decided that he wanted to dedicate himself to photographing in every one of the National Parks, which apparently nobody has ever done before. The 58 prints in the exhibit are large (I'd estimate 20x30"

or larger) and for the most part awe-inspiring. The captions tell the story of how he captured each image and are often nearly as impressive as the photographs themselves.

The museum itself is worth a visit at any time – currently they're also showing a collection of photographs of historic art-deco movie theaters and a fascinating collection of intricate and quirky mechanical clocks (think cuckoo clocks on steroids...) built by a gentleman from the North Shore.

It should be remembered that these plugins are third party and that they may not be available for all versions of elements. You can always try them, the most that they can do is not work. They won't do harm (I think).

Chris Day would suggest the following work flow Do all of your global tonal adjustments in camera raw, even if the image is jpg.
Do not sharpen yet if you intend to do further work in photoshop. Cropping is fine.
Now do any further adjustments in photoshop.
Finally sharpen and save.

Chris also notes that all linear adjustments including rotate can be done using free transform and the appropriate control key rather than locking one into a single operation using the fly out menu. It is quicker and more versatile.

The adjustments in camera raw are arranged so that the easiest results are obtained by using the sliders top to bottom. Jumping around may lead to changes that diverge rather than converge on the desired result.

Clarity and vibrance are not really intuitively obvious names. From the technical point of view:

Clarity increases the mid tone black and white contrast without effecting the extremes. Vibrance increases the mid tone color saturation leaving the extremes untouched.

Chris personally finds these definitions much easier to comprehend. This is important since these two controls are very useful. If you don't know what to look for it can be quite difficult to make good judgments.

Other improvements made by Adobe is to modify the action of brightness and contrast. In most programs these can lead to clipping if overdone, a well known problem in simple editors like Picasa and others. Adobe modified both so that they would bend the curves at the extremes to prevent saturation. This avoids common problems when one is in a hurryand doesn't keep an eye on the white and black levels. One can edit these two functions operations in PREFERENCES to return them to the older type for die hards.
