July Meeting Notes

Ed McGuirk's presentations were outstanding. The first was a five-minute show about loons, the result of spending many years photographing and studying loons in New Hampshire. He has moved to digital cameras and used a Canon 7D with 500mm lens with a 1.4 converter for the closeups of the loons.

The main presentation was a very complete illustrated lesson plan in landscape photography.

He mainly used the Canon 7D for the images that illustrated the points in his outline. He shoots only in raw and invariably uses a tripod. He uses Lightroom in the computer to make whatever adjustments to produce the final luminous images. A few tips: Use vibrancy rather than saturation. Presets are useful in fully utilizing the Lightroom potentials. He doesn't do much tweaking of his images, however.

He gave us very useful tips on <u>composition</u> -- the basic and serviceable rule of thirds, look for S and C curves triangular formations, and leading edges; repetition; strong foreground, midground, and background to give pleasing effects. Look also for textures and patterns.

He covered <u>lighting</u> and shadows, instructing us that early morning (as in just before dawn) and late afternoon give the best natural light. Overcast weather gives even light and good color saturation, and you don't have to get up at 4 a.m. to get it. Ed thinks nothing of getting up at 3 a.m. and hiking by flashlight to just the place he wants to take a shot as the sun creeps over the horizon.)

Ed does quite a bit of research on a location before actually going there to photograph. He checks weather, the best spots to photograph, and other things such as where the sun and moon rises and sets. Web sites help to give him this information.

Some of his favorite locations for photography: Groton State Forest in Vermont, and Arnold Arboretum, Hopkinton State Park, Quabbin Reservoir, Petersham, Walden Pond, and Blue Hills in Massachusetts.

Miscellaneous tips:

1. Polarizer helps in shots of rainbows, but the camera must be at right angles to the sun.

2. Go for complimentary colors.

3. Shadows can give accent lines to your image. Have shadows and lines to go a point, from bottom to top of image.
