The Evening's Presentation

Bird Photography: Insights and Inspiration

Mike's up-front admission that *there is no simple answer* was borne out in the rest of the presentation. Mike included many useful tips (not only *hows* but *whys*) on camera settings and field techniques. The concepts he covered ranged from exposure, to focus, to composition, to presentation, to lighting, and further. One would have been forgiven for thinking he was talking about photography in general, for, in the broadest sense, he was. Its just that when the subject happens to be a bird, the desiderata become that much more difficult to fulfill and the techniques and gear become proportionally more specialized.

Mike's presentational style is consistently engaging and, above all, clear. This eases listener comprehension; fatigue is just not a problem. Above all, his first-rate photos vouch for the instructional content. Mike describes his presentation as "a selection of his bird images along with commentary intended to inform, entertain, and inspire." There is little doubt that those in attendance agreed that the intention was fulfilled.

Macro Workshop

As mentioned in last month's newsletter, Ed McGuirk has offered to lead a workshop for interested members on photographing minerals at macro scale with cross-polarized lighting. The workshop will be held on Sunday, November 12, at 1:00 in the Great Room (not the Community Room) at Newbury Court. Ed writes, "Sometime in October I will send out more detailed information about what to expect. But very briefly all you need to bring is a Compact Flash or SD card. I will have a station with my camera/macro lens/cross polarization flash/copy stand already set up, all you have to do is insert your card in my camera, create the composition that you want on the minerals, and focus manually (I can help anyone do that if necessary). Hendrik will have a similar setup so we can shoot from two stations.

"The colors in the minerals look best if they are wet, thus we need to use the cross polarization on the flash to eliminate glare on the wet minerals. This is why you do not need to bring your own camera or lens."
