Member Images Night - Where Henry Went

Wayne Hall showed several film scans. The first three images, taken along the Concord River, included a view of the Sudbury River from the Nashawtuc Road Bridge (right). Wayne then offered two versions of a photo taken on Cape Cod in Rock Harbor at sunset, the original in portrait orientation



and a crop in landscape. The room showed a slight preference for the landscape version.



Stephen Gabeler offered several images in the spirit of Thoreau as scientific investigator. This summer, Gabe made a cross-country road trip to Farewell Bend State Park, OR, where he viewed the solar eclipse from essentially the center line. A pair of images demonstrated the projection of the partial solar disk through leaves of a tree. Two different photos of totality from two different cameras showed the planet Mercury at about 7:30 in relation to the sun & moon (left). Finally, Gabe also displayed a time lapse he

had assembled showing the very rapid darkening that occurs in the last 15 seconds before totality.


Anne Umphrey brought five photos of the Concord area. For one, of an acorn surrounded by a spider's web, she showed three versions. The room responded helpfully. Other images shown included a late afternoon vista at Great Meadows National Wildlife



Refuge (right) and one of Gowings Swamp in the fall.

Mark Hopkins offered five Thoreau-themed photos that provoked a good deal of comment. The last of them, which Mark has titled, "Memories Receding", is an image, taken from the Old North Bridge, of his shadow cast on the sky-blue water, which is garnished with autumn leaves floating downstream. He also showed some sophisticated processing in Photoshop Elements he had done of a group photo to restore Betsy Moyer to her proper stature, rescuing her from the ravages of too much perspective.

Hendrik Broekman showed five photos, mostly of wildlife, taken from the Sudbury River in the vicinity of Sherman's Bridge.



Along with three different images of the stone boathouse on Fair Haven Bay, **Terri Ackerman** solicited comments on four different treatments of Lee's bridge. The one at the left prevailed. Two images of bluebirds followed.

Sue Abrahamsen also traveled west to see the eclipse but was far enough north of the center line only to have about half the time of totality that Gabe had experienced. Nevertheless, she offered a composite eclipse sequence as well as a photo of the "diamond ring" moment. The Thoreau-themed photos included some darker subject matter: one of decaying lily pads and the other of a dragonfly trapped in a spider's web.

Birding at select Mass Sanctuaries with Eric Smith

Eric Smith is scheduled to give a talk on bird photography that goes light on "How" but goes into detail on "What" and "Where". He will discuss the Daniel Webster Mass Audubon Sanctuary, Parker River National Wildlife Refuge, and Wellfleet Bay Mass Audubon Sanctuary.

Eric Smith has been taking pictures most of his life, but the first "good" DSLRs were a great enabler. The instant feedback and ability to learn quickly really launched him into this as a passion. Now he's been taking wildlife pictures seriously for nearly 15 years and still having lots of fun. He specializes in birds, but all wildlife interests him because, in the end, he just loves being outdoors and immersed in nature. Eric has been published locally and nationally. For the last 10 years he has been teaching the Digital Photography Field School class at Wellfleet Bay Mass Audubon Sanctuary, along with running a local Photo Club, and teaching photography and showing pictures at a variety of clubs and organizations around New England.
