INCLUDING MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 13 MEETING

October Presentation – Hendrik and Mai-Lan Broekman

"Gunkholing" is loosely defined as "taking your boat where bigger boats can't go". In May of 2022, Hendrik and Mai-Lan, along with seven other adventurous souls, did exactly that with a sevenday cruise from Petersburg to Juneau along Alaska's Inside Passage. This was the vessel's first Alaska cruise of the season, and all of it was on the sheltered waters of the Inside Passage.

The vessel for the voyage was M/V Catalyst, built as a research vessel in 1932, and still driven by the original engine! It carried a crew of four, including a naturalist and a cook. Accommodations were a tad tight (only one person could stand up in a "stateroom" at a time.)

Hendrik and Mai's photographs, plus a few short videos, took us day by day through the week, with spectacular scenery, flora and fauna. There were plenty of opportunities for hiking and kayaking excursions (what, no snorkeling???).

At this time of year, the deciduous trees were just beginning to leaf out, but there were wildflowers aplenty. "Ports of call", using the term somewhat loosely (anchorages might be a better term), included Scenery Cove, Donkey Bay, Brother Islands, Endicott Arm, Twin Meadows, Dawes Glacier, Ford's Terror, Sanford Cove, and Taku Harbor.

There were terrific photographs of Arctic terns, white wing scoters, Barrows goldeneyes, loons, cormorants, bald eagles, belted kingfishers, harlequin ducks, and others. Many of these were action shots, showing off the ability of Hendrik's Olympus system to capture them.

Marine fauna included orcas, humpbacks, sea otters, seals, sea lions, a purple shore crab, starfish, and porpoises. Land-based wildlife included mink and a banana slug (not cute...). No bears except for one very far away, although this is big bear country.

In the flora category, there were images of bunchberry, devil's club, giant skunk cabbage, chocolate lily (popular among bears), deer heart, bog laurel, marsh marigold, mosses, and "fairy barf" (I'm not making this up and no, I don't know the Latin name) lichen.

Rainforests, waterfalls, glaciers (receding, unfortunately), and lots of mountains, inlets, coves, etc. made up the collection of more general landscape images, really giving the viewer a great sense of place.

All in all it was an inspiring and enjoyable evening sharing a unique and fascinating trip, beautifully photographed and narrated!

Jean Fain displayed five images, some taken with a new camera. A photo taken at Assabet NWR combined the oranges of fall colors with the blue of a clear sky and its darker, richer reflection in a still pond with dead trees. Lots to look at. A photo taken at Damon Mill involved reflections of another sort. Two images of fallen leaves, one a maple leaf floating on the water surface, the other a backlit oak leaf in grass, followed. Finally, Jean offered a double exposure of her cat superimposed against a large cloud formation which suggested an animal of heroic proportions. This was produced with the help of Nicole Mordecai. On the subject of moving on from solely using a smartphone as well as widening her repertory of skills, Jean enthused, "I'm learning up a storm."

Terri Ackerman showed a series of photographs taken on a recent trip to the American red rock country. The first was of some boulders, the shapes of which could be interpreted as animals. After that was a series shot at Monument Valley largely of both West and East Mitten Buttes, first at sunset and then before sunrise. The weather cooperated in both instances. Finally Terri offered a fine photo shot at Antelope Canyon of a subject that is well away from the usual imagery we have become used to.

Nicole Mordecai brought photos taken both on the East and West coasts of the continent. She opened with two images of a black bear near the Outer Banks of North Carolina. It turns out that a very large concentration of Black Bears lives at the Alligator River Wildlife Refuge. Nicole followed with two photos taken at East Coast fish ladders. One, shot in the center of Winchester, MA (!), showed an interaction between a gull and a night heron. Then, from a tour at Butchart Gardens in Victoria, B.C., we had some lovely closeups. Nicole finished the set with a fun image of the B.C. Capitol Building at dusk, lit up along with a water display.


Around the Web


Please Note – All meetings are held on the 2nd Thursday of the month, at 7:00 pm, either via Zoom or at our location (or both):
