Evening Presentation - Wildlife Photography in Massachusetts

We were privileged to host Steve Forman, who is one of the most prolific contributors to the *Nature Sightings* page of the Sudbury Valley Trustees website. His program, entitled *Finding and Photographing Wildlife (Mostly Birds)*, was presented in person at Newbury Court with no Zoom component.

Ten years ago, as he started to contemplate his long career in mechanical engineering winding down, Steve decided to enroll in photography classes at the Danforth Museum School. Over the intervening years he has shot ever more difficult subjects with a succession of ever more competent cameras.

Steve currently shoots with a pair of Canon R5 mirrorless cameras and, for wildlife, can mount some seriously long lenses. He mentioned using a 100-500mm zoom with a 1.4x teleconverter for handholding and a 400mm f/2.8 lens with a 2x teleconverter attached to a gimbal head for use with a mono- or tripod. The rest of his workflow is simple enough. He prefers shooting Jpeg in manual mode and his post-processing is pretty much limited to using Apple's Photos app on an iMac (desktop). He does use Topaz Sharpen AI and DeNoise AI when necessary, likewise Photoshop Elements for elementary pixel-by-pixel manipulation.

So much for photographing wildlife. That still leaves finding subjects. Steve offered a list of places he goes to photograph wildlife which includes twenty-four individual sites. While taking notes for this article, I had a hard time keeping up with the over 100 images shown and discussed. Nevertheless, I suspect that the list of sites we were given was constructed from the images shown and may be no

more than a faint approximation of every place Steve *has ever* shot in the area. Given that Steve prefers to engage in his image collection efforts during the middle of the day when wildlife can become relatively scarce, the locations he mentions must be very productive, indeed. Midday or not, he clearly gets out and about. He asserts that this is not work but fun. (I have appended a page to the end of this Newsletter with Steve's list of productive sites.)

A list of the species of birds Steve included in the presentation would be very long and I shall not attempt one. Needless to say, all the usual suspects were represented in healthy numbers as well as many species less usually encountered. Shore birds, water birds, song birds, raptors - you name it. If it appears regularly in the area, Steve probably showed at least one fine image of one. Reptiles, insects and mammals also made appearances.

Steve ended the talk with a short primer on shooting wildlife. He explained that the quick movements of wildlife, and of birds in particular, require fast shutter speeds. The two corollaries to fast shutter speed that help achieve good exposure are maximum aperture and auto iso. Throughout the talk, Steve was available to answer questions about gear or technique. The room was enthusiastic and appreciative about the presentation and let Steve know it.
