Happy 21st Birthday, SVNP!

Last month we noted in passing the happy occasion of SVNP turning twenty-one. This month we have the first installment in Betsy Moyer's memoir of the group:

October 26, 2016, marked the 21st birthday of the Sudbury Valley Nature Photographers. Not much has changed in the philosophy of the group since those beginnings 21 years ago when 14 photographers met in the Raytheon Room of Wayland Public Library "to share informally our interest in and knowledge of photography." We wanted no officers, no competitions, no dues, just a nurturing and sharing spirit of encouragement in which we might enjoy and improve our photographic abilities and our appreciation of nature.

The guiding spirit of SVNP for many years was photographer Budd Titlow, who actually founded the group and who led our meetings and took us on monthly field trips. Our field trips took us to almost every wildlife area of note in Massachusetts, and we even organized a trip to Utah to visit the national parks in that state. Continuing that tradition Carol Walsh and Hendrik Broekman have organized field trips, including one to Zion National Park in 2015.

By 2001 our group had become so large we had to move our meetings from the Wayland Public Library to Traditions of Wayland, an assisted living facility with a very large and welcome meeting Room. Henry Weisenberger, one of our original 14 members, donated a projector screen and window shades to the room to make it a perfect location for our meetings. The management of Traditions installed picture molding in several of their halls, and this was an ideal location for a permanent rotating gallery for members' prints.

We all started out as film photographers; there was no such thing as digital photography. We had discussions and presentations on various kinds of film, cameras, lenses, tripods, the best and cheapest places to get film processed. Around 2002, digital photography and digital cameras gained traction, and many of us switched gradually, sometimes painfully. That was about the time our good friend and mentor, Budd, moved to North Carolina. We gave him a big sendoff party, and Wayne and I morphed into co-chairs of SVNP.

The Evening's Presentation

Hendrik Broekman presented the third seminar in the series – this one focused on two topics requested by several members – noise reduction and sharpening.

He began by dissecting a number of works of art found in the Worcester Art Museum and around the internet, to illustrate the fundamental building blocks of non-photographic artwork – dots, lines, surfaces, etc. This effectively laid the foundation for working with the base element of digital photographs – the pixel. Through many examples drawn from his own photography, he created in the attendees a deeper understanding of the relationship between noise and a lack of adequate sharpness. He presented many scenarios for addressing both issues, mostly in Lightroom, but also in Photoshop. Many of the "fixes" involved a long series of successive adjustments, using "unsharp mask", various smoothing techniques, the "clarity" adjustment, edge masking, and other ways of reducing noise and increasing sharpness. He stressed the importance of proper exposure

and the use of the lowest feasible ISO setting to reduce the likelihood of noise problems developing in the first place.

Hendrik has produced a very informative and interesting handout, which can be found on SVNP's website here.

Although some appeared to feel a bit overwhelmed by the volume of material presented, others (including the author) realized later that they had in fact learned a lot more than they originally might have thought.

Barbara Peskin talked enthusiastically about her puffin photography. She also discussed some of the satisfactions to be derived from photography in relation to her image of a bluebird on display.

Bob Cooke related his history in photography from film in high school to digital at retirement. His mantra? "Take a lot of pictures and throw the bad ones away."

Stephen Gabeler spoke about being a nature photographer, "whatever that might be." This year, the 100th of the National Park Service, he chose to display images from federally protected land.

Wayne Hall presented a short discussion of the two photographs he is exhibiting. One of them, "Trap Falls", is from Willard Brook State Forest and the other, "The Rookery", from Lyons Cutler Reservation (an SVT property in Sudbury). They share the number *three* as the organizing principle.
