Title: Hiking In The Teton, Yellowstone and Glacier National Parks.

This is probably the most appropriate title as nearly every day we walked or hiked, in the parks or quite near them, even when raining. The photos were taken with my point and shoot Nikon Lite-Touch Zoom 140 ED QD camera, which has excellent optics with its 38-140mm f/5.3-10.5 Nikon ED zoom lens. While it was a blessing to carry such a light camera, I found myself frustrated not having with me my professional level Nikon F100 with 100mm macro, 28-105mm zoom, 80-400mm VR zoom lenses, and Manfrotto carbon tripod.

However, hauling around 15 pounds of camera gear, plus clothing, water, food and first aid, was too much to carry on my back in my knapsack at my age.

Recap of February 10 General Meeting

Because of the icy roads and snowy weather, there was a small turnout and no new members. Thanks to the twenty stalwarts who attended.

Member Digital and Slide Images

Because Don Sherman had brought the digital projector, we began the meeting by viewing digital images from member photographers.

Linda Crews showed digital images of owls photographed at the Raptor Recovery Program run by Larry Keating in Western Massachusetts. She uses a Nikon Cool Pix 5700 digital camera.

Dave Hudson showed digital images photographed at Roger Williams Park Zoo taken with a Canon 10D Digital SLR camera and a 300mm lens.

Don Sherman showed digital images of animals taken on an African photo safari led by Michael Reichman in January 04. He too used a Canon 10D Digital SLR camera with 80–200mm and 100–400mm zoom lenses. Don recommends a website www.luminous-landscape.com.

Betsy Moyer showed digital images of Vinalhaven, Maine, part of her show currently at Emerson Hospital.

After the main presentation Bill Peters showed slides of Wachusett and Schoodic Point, west of Bar Harbor, some taken in the 1980s.

Presentation: "Why the West Was Won," Richard Beaudette

Dick handed out programs that explained his "automated audiovisual slide presentation depicting images of the American West," and told what music accompanied each of the nine segments, Arizona, Utah, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Peace Park, California, Oregon, and Washington.

Quoting further from his program, "Formidable natural forces occurring over geologic time have created breathtaking beauty in the form of massive, picturesque mountains, panoramic vistas of unusual stone formations and pristine lakes. This land is home to a broad variety of wild animals and plants. Many are unique to our United States."

The 40-minute multimedia slide show presented the wide variety of "natural attributes of the western states, through dramatic images obtained in places pioneered by the likes of John Muir, Ansel Adams, and Lewis and Clark."

Richard Beaudette is a past president of the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists and the Brockton Camera Club and a member of the Photographic Society of America and the Yankee Photographic Association.

News from The Sudbury Valley Trustees

You are invited to participate in The Second Annual Photography Contest of the Sudbury, Assabet and Concord Rivers, in conjunction with RIVERFEST, June 11-12, '05

Eligible Subjects: Color or black and white photographs of only the following three subjects will be accepted for the contest:

- 1) the rivers, and their tributaries
- 2) flora, wildlife and birds of the rivers and their tributaries
- 3) people using the rivers and their tributaries; walking, boating, fishing etc. etc.

Framing requirements: Each photographic print must be framed and matted and equipped with a wire suitable for hanging. Maximum frame size is 16" x 20". Each photo must have a business card loosely taped to the frame with the following information: the title of the image, the location and date it was taken, the name of the photographer, price if for sale, and the subject category it is entered in. Each photo also must have a self-addressed stamped postcard taped to the back with the title of the image.

Entry Fee: Each photographer may submit up to three photographs. Entry fees are as follows: \$10.00 for the first photograph; \$5.00 for each additional photograph for SVT members; \$10.00 for each additional photograph for non-members. All fees are payable at the time of delivery to SVT and are non-refundable. *All fees will be used to support the land protection programs of SVT*.

Drop-Off: All photographs may be dropped off at the offices of SVT at the Wolbach Farm, Rt. 27, Sudbury, any weekday from April 19 to April 29. SVT will notify each photographer by mail whether or not each image has been given an award. Photographs which have not been given an award must be picked up on Thursday, May 12 or Friday, May 13 between 2pm-5pm.

Awards: A panel of judges will give awards for first, second, third place and two honorable mentions in each category. In addition, the judges will give an award for the Best of Show photo.

Prizes: Each photographer submitting a photograph that is accepted for the contest will receive a complementary copy of Frank Gohlke's book of photographs: *The Sudbury River: A Celebration*

Exhibitions: The award winning photographs will presented at the SVT Annual Meeting on Sunday, May 15 at the Wolbach Farm, Sudbury, and may be shown thereafter at other locations in the Metro West area.
