INCLUDING MINUTES OF THE JULY 11 MEETING

The Evening's Presentation - Phyllis Neufeld

This past October (10/23) **Phyllis Neufeld** and her husband traveled with the tour company, <u>Hurtigruten</u>, to both Patagonia and Antarctica in a single cruise. In her January program, devoted to the Antarctic portion of the trip, Phyllis had promised to talk about Patagonia sometime in the future. This program was the happy fulfillment of that I.O.U.

Chile and, more particularly, Patagonia served as the bookends to the group's Antarctic foray. The trip started with a short stay in Santiago, Chile's capitol city, far from Patagonia. The city boasts a wide variety of architecture, from classic 19th century postcolonial civic buildings to gleaming modern skyscrapers. Much of the built environment is colorfully decorated with murals of all sorts, from floral *trompe l'oeil* to fantasy scenes of indeterminate meaning with, in between, more than a smattering of everything else.

The voyage proper started in Valparaiso with embarkation on the MS Fram. The ship sailed south along the rugged Chilean coast, stopping for shore visits several places. These locales became ever more utilitarian and isolated as the road network petered out, the numbers of the latitudes increased and the population density dropped. Uncivilized and unspoiled are two sides of the same coin.

Once on board, the wildlife spotting began in earnest. The species list was long, too long to fully report. Sea birds were very well represented, as might be expected, and with cameo appearances from such flight-averse species as Magellanic Penguins and Steamer Ducks. Mammals included a Blue Whale, Chilean Dolphins and Sea

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Lions. This activity subsided somewhat once the ship reached Patagonia and entered into the maze of inland passages along, or adjacent to, the Strait of Magellan, some of which are quite narrow. There are upward of 850 named bodies of water – channels, straits, sounds, bays, etc. – in the region off the mainland. The use of Chilean pilots is required in these waters. Here the landscape became the star, culminating in sights of Corcovado and Torre de la Paine. The first part of the voyage culminated with a visit to Puerto Williams (to drop off the pilot.) The town claims to be the southernmost settlement in the world.

On the return from the Antarctic Peninsula, a visit was made to Puerto Williams (presumably to pick up the pilot) and thence to Puerto Arenas, where the return flight to the hyper-developed world started.

As before, Phyllis constructed her presentation in imitation of a photo album in which each succeeding page might have any number of related images displayed in any arrangement. One or several photos might be commented upon but there were often plenty more to which the eye could wander. These pages helped move things along and added a comforting sense of context while the occasional appearance of larger photos of a single animal added emphasis. In the time available, Phyllis gave due consideration to the social organization of the country as well as its agronomy.

The group was voluble in its appreciation of the program and its many enlightening features. It was praise well deserved.

A striking Red-Tail in flight was next. 




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An Invitation from your Editor
